Village Plan out soon!

It's been announced that another milestone will be reached this summer with the publication of the final Ruddington Village Plan (RVP) – your vision for how our village should develop over the next 5 to 10 years.



Beginning in 2013, the Village Plan has been painstakingly formulated by an independent Steering Group made up of around twenty volunteers who live and/or work in Ruddington, alongside up to three Ruddington Parish Council representatives. Supported throughout the process by staff from Rural Community Action

Nottinghamshire, it's been created based on the issues and concerns that were raised by a detailed questionnaire delivered to all village households and businesses in 2015.

This followed previous consultations with residents, visitors, local business, schools, medical practices, councils, etc. on all aspects of Ruddington life – the good and perhaps not so good.

There were then further public consultations in the summer of 2016 in St Peter's Rooms and on the streets of Ruddington before work continued in monthly meetings on the final version of the Village Plan. This will be presented at this year's Ruddington Parish Council 'Summer Fayre,' being held on The Green on Saturday 19th August, between 12 noon and 6pm.

At this launch event, which will be staffed by RVP volunteers, you'll be able to pick up a printed version of the completed document, ask questions, and volunteer yourself for projects flagged up by the research. These include keeping our village tidy, vehicle speed monitoring, the proposed sensory garden, multi-use games area, outdoor gym and pétanque piste. There'll also be a fun children's competition based around Ruddington landmarks!

The final plan itself will contain a raft of goals and action points which, when implemented, should enhance life for everyone who lives in, works

in or visits Ruddington. Topics include housing, planning, conservation, heritage, sport & recreation, transport, policing, the Parish Council and Emergency Planning – now considered even more important in the light of recent UK terrorist attacks.

RVP Steering Group Chairman Gavin Walker said: "I'd like to thank everyone who has contributed to the Village Plan. It's going to be exciting over the coming months and years to see our vision become a reality!"

Ruddington boundary signs are up!

How our amazing new boundary signs were designed and created.

Stage 1: Design – WigWag

Tasked with the exciting project of creating new village signage for Ruddington, the Design Team at WigWag worked with Faye from the Parish Council to develop a series of concepts that depicted some of the village's most iconic features.

Drawing inspiration from the Framework Knitters Museum, St Peter's Rooms and a GCRN steam trains, one of our designers, Owen, envisioned a scene whereby a

traditional locomotive passes through the village's historic buildings.



This concept was further developed into a beautiful watercolour interpretation which has formed the basis of our new signage.

Stage 2: Build – Sign of the Times

Following the approval of our design, we worked with the Parish Council and Lyndie from Signs Of The Times (a specialist production company based in Leighton Buzzard) to create Ruddington's new boundary signs.

Transforming our concept into beautiful signage, each element of our design was accurately cut from wood and layered to create depth within the depicted scene.

With the cast created, our watercolour-inspired design was

then hand-painted on to each of the boundary signs with stunning detail.

Working with a single artist to ensure a consistent style was maintained, the WigWag team were thrilled with the final artwork!

Stage 3: Installation – RM Installations

After long awaited anticipation, we were happy to see the new Ruddington signs installed by RM Installations on Friday 21 July.

You can see the new boundary signs at the five entrances to the Village: Loughborough Road (north and south), Wilford Road, Clifton Lane and Flawforth Lane.



WigWag are really proud to have been commissioned for such an exciting project and would like to thank Ruddington Parish Council for allowing us this opportunity.

Summer Fayre returns to Ruddington

St Peter's Junior School presented with life-saving defibrillator

Our local junior school has raised funds to install a defibrillator to save lives in our village. Pupils and staff at St Peter's Junior School on Ashworth Avenue wanted to ensure visitors and all users of the school had access to a defibrillator, as the nearest one is some distance away and the school is a busy community hub.



As a result of various fundraising activities and events, such as collecting 5ps in the summer holidays, a pupils' disco and their recent summer fair and car boot sale, the Friends of St Peter's Junior School Ruddington (FOS) charity was able to make a donation of over £500 to the school to purchase the defibrillator.

The brand new defibrillator has now been placed in the entrance foyer of the school and has adult and child sized pads. Staff at the school have also received training in the use of the device.

Head teacher John Mapperley said: "I am delighted to receive this defibrillator on behalf of the school; it offers peace of mind to the staff that we are able to respond quickly and appropriately before an ambulance arrives. I would like to thank the FOS as we could not afford this from our normal school budget."

Jennifer Boniface, the Chair and Trustee of the FOS Charity, said: "This is one item we have purchased for the school that we sincerely hope never has to be used! However, should the worst happen, we are pleased that this life-saving piece equipment is now available to everyone at St Peter's."

FOS continues to work hard to raise funds to benefit the school, and will complete their next project of the construction of a new outdoor classroom in the summer holidays.

Ruddington Village Museum at the Local History and Archaeology Day

On Saturday 8th July, Ruddington Village Museum presented a collection of World War One artefacts at the Local History and Archaeology day organised by The University of Nottingham Museum. The event featured various local history groups and archaeological societies. Organisers were able to build on the success of the previous year's event, creating an enjoyable and informative day for all.



At the Ruddington Village Museum display, visitors were able to view a range of fascinating World War One artefacts, many of which have a special connection to Ruddington.

As visitors entered the exhibition, one of the first artefacts on display was a striking costume dress which was hand-made to illustrate food rationing, which came into effect in spring 1918. The dress is decorated with coupons for different foods which were rationed.

Also prominent among the exhibits was the large Union Flag which decorated the Ruddington War Memorial at its unveiling by the Duke of Portland on 19th May 1923.

The more unusual artefacts sparked the most interest from visitors, especially a decorative mat worked by a blind serviceman helped by St Dunstan's, a charity which rehabilitated servicemen who lost their sight in the war.

Other textile artefacts featured in the display included a tea cosy and runner worked with traditional Dutch scenes by the donor's father while in a prisoner of war camp hospital. Also on display were a souvenir celebrating the rebuilding of Ypres Cloth Hall, and a cushion cover embroidered by a Ruddington resident to celebrate the end of the war, bearing the legend 'Victory and Peace'.

Ann Inscker, Curator of Archaeology and Industry for Nottingham City Council, described Ruddington Village Museum's contribution as "a lovely display".

The exhibition formed part of a series of World War One centenary events taking place in Nottinghamshire up until November 2018.

County success for St Peter's

After winning the Rushcliffe schools' hockey tournament back in March, St Peter's Junior School Year 6 Hockey Team qualified to represent Rushcliffe at the Nottinghamshire School Games, held on Friday 7 July.

The School Games included 18 sports, from table tennis to lacrosse, and was attended by both primary and secondary school children representing each borough in Nottinghamshire.

Know your exit from your entrance!

The Parish Council office has received complaints recently about drivers using the entrance instead of the exit to leave the Church Street car park next to the Co-op. This is despite the entrance on Church

Street clearly being signposted as 'No exit' and the actual exit on Shaw Street also being clearly marked.

To tackle the problem, the Parish Council (which owns the car park) is considering investing in extra 'No exit' signage, to make it even clearer that drivers shouldn't be leaving the car park through the entrance.

It's unfortunate that residents' Council Tax payments have to be used like this, because of the actions of a careless few. However, the alternative options, such as installing entrance and exit barriers, would cost a lot more – and given the obvious safety issues involved, 'Do nothing' isn't an option at all.

Public spirit alive and well in Rudd

A public spirited villager has come to the rescue in Ruddington. The pavement on the corner of St John's Road and St Mary's Crescent has a very steep kerb.

This makes it difficult (even dangerous) for mobility scooter and wheelchair users, people with prams and people with pushchairs to negotiate the corner safely. A complaint was received by the Parish Council after a mobility scooter user fell into the road from the slope. Fortunately, the lady was

only slightly injured. The Parish Council office contacted Nottinghamshire County Council who replied there was nothing they could do at this time.



Step in local resident Ian Wilson, whose home adjoins the corner in question. Ian is having the wall outside his house rebuilt and rendered, and asked the builders to change the angle of the new wall to allow part of his land to be used to make the footway wider – thereby making it easier for everyone to negotiate the corner safely.

Modestly, Ian said “I was aware that there have been several dangerous incidents on that corner, so rebuilding the wall was a great opportunity to help out”. Local resident, Christine Smith, who turns that corner in her scooter on an almost daily basis, said “I am really grateful to Ian for helping us out. My

husband, Tony, has been to thank him personally”. Lots of others have echoed these sentiments. However, despite the improvements, drivers are still urged to drive with real caution, particularly during the school run, as incidents are still occurring where motorists are cutting the corner and mounting the pavement.

Ian is a good example to us all, showing how a relatively small but very important gesture can improve the quality and safety of people’s lives. Well done Ian.
