Third Olympics for village skater

An ice dancer from Ruddington has secured her place on Team GB at the 2018 Winter Games in PyeongChang after winning an Olympic qualifying competition.



Penny Coomes and figure skating partner Nick Buckland, who hails from Wilford, built on their initial lead in the “Short Dance” section with victory in the “Free Dance” at Oberstdorf in Germany – so lifting the Nebelhorn Trophy.

This victory means that South Korea will now be the third trip to a Winter

Olympics for our local duo, having also represented Team GB at Vancouver in 2010 and Sochi in 2014.

After her victory in Germany, Penny took to social media to say: “Thank you UK Sport & The National Lottery for supporting Nick and I through my knee injury. We couldn’t have qualified for our third Games without you.”

She also tweeted a picture (see front page) adding: “A HUGE thank you to my amazing Physio @TATaylorK @TheISEH for being with me every step of the way. I wouldn’t be back without your super powers!”

Remembrance Services

As usual, there will be two events commemorating the Armistice and Remembrance Day this November.

However, this year's Armistice Day service will be slightly different from usual as it will feature the dedication of the new Roll of Honour board for the War Memorial garden on Church Street, as reported last month.

The dedication ceremony will take place on Saturday 11th November at 10:45am, to be followed by the usual two minute silence at 11am and the playing of The Last Post by the Army Cadets' Bugler.



On Sunday 12th November, a Parade and Service of Remembrance will be held at the War Memorial, followed by Morning Service at St. Peter's Church.

Weather permitting, the parade of local organisations – headed by the Ruddington Detachment RHR Corps of Drums and Bugles – will march to the War Memorial before the service.

Members of the public who are driving to the service are asked to park considerately and arrive in plenty of time as road closures will be in place for the duration of the event.

Community hub for former Youth Centre?

The former Youth and Community Centre on The Green could soon be put back into use as a “community hub” for our village if a group of Ruddington residents has their way.

In 2014, the Nottinghamshire County Council-owned premises were threatened with closure when government spending cuts meant the council could no longer afford to run them. Subsequently, however, they were leased out to fitness firm Project Body UK on the basis that youth provision would be reintroduced there three days a week.



This began to happen last summer and several community organisations and groups were again starting to use the facilities on a weekly basis. But then Project Body UK closed down after running into financial difficulties last December, and the building has lain dark and disused ever since. It was also targeted by vandals in June 2017,

emphasising the need to do something with the empty property sooner rather than later.

Now, a group of local residents has come together to propose taking over the building as “The Green Space,” should the County Council decide to put it back out to tender.

This is a community-led initiative and the group is welcoming other people’s ideas and involvement. Dedicated “Green Space” stalls at the Ruddington Summer Fayre and James Peacock 50th Anniversary celebration event provided an opportunity for residents to give their thoughts and ideas about how the space could be used. And an online survey has already garnered almost 200 responses.

Ian Wilson, one of the project leads, said: “We would like to make a space in the village where people can come together. We will provide the space and support; we ask you to provide your ideas and passion. We would like to thank local businesses Adlard Print, Jaspers Café and Mr Tee for their support, which gives us confidence that ‘The Green Space’ will be a true community hub. From local information, a crèche, pop-up shops, event hire space, through to art exhibitions, alpacas and co-working space – the potential for

this fantastically situated space is endless!”

Joanna Jagiello, also a member of the The Green Space group, added: “As well as providing a real and effective community hub, we want to provide Ruddington with a place to be proud of. So our proposal will not only include excellent community-driven services but will also include plans to improve the appearance of the building itself.”



The project team hope to hear from the County Council soon.

Meet Ruddington resident, John Russell

John is the founder of the award-winning Lenton Lane Microbrewery.



John moved to Ruddington from West Bridgford in 2007 and has lived here ever since.

He worked as a freelance web developer and still does, but in 2014 he founded the Lenton Lane Microbrewery (www.lentonlane.co.uk), whose beers have been selling really well in Ruddington pubs and elsewhere.

The brewery produces 4,000 pints of beer every week and regularly wins awards for its quality.

The name tells you where the brewery is, but it could have been based in Ruddington and creating jobs locally. However, suitable

business premises weren't available in the village at the time.

"I really like living in Ruddington" said John. "It's quiet and genteel (for the most part!) but close enough to town for all the facilities and attractions there".

John was asked to describe three good things about Ruddington. He said:

1. The people. I've made good friends here. People are friendly. After 10 years or so of living here, one or two have even bought me a pint.

2. The shops and amenities. I rarely do any day-to-day shopping outside Ruddington. I live so close that I treat the Co-op like a walk-in larder. And of course, the pubs – who could forget the pubs? The buses are good, too.

3. The Country Park. We're very lucky to have this.

What's not so good about the village? John said:

1. Traffic. Getting in and out at peak times can be a little trying.

2. Parking. Church Street is a thoroughfare, not a car park. People reverse out in front of me every single day I drive there.

3. Space. We would have liked to open the brewery here in

Ruddington, but there just wasn't anywhere suitable at all. So, the opportunity to produce and sell Ruddy Good Ale was lost.

So there you have it: John's personal take on Ruddington life.

The point about there being an absence of suitable premises to open a business that would create local jobs and wealth, and add prestige to Ruddington, is something for the planners to note.

Staying safe on social media

The internet is an interesting place. You can learn a lot with it, keep in contact with friends and family, and even speak to people from all around the world. Whilst it can be beneficial and fun, social media does come with a few downsides, which could lead you into dangerous situations with lasting effects.

To help you stay safe online, just follow these 3 simple rules.

1. Know how and when to block/report somebody

It's important to know what to do when someone is bugging you on social media. Blocking them is one of the most effective ways to stop them contacting you. It's usually pretty easy to block a user – just head over to their profile and there should be a 'Block' button.

This is normally quite easy to spot, as most apps and websites are aware of online dangers. Just know that the power is in your hands! So if someone is causing you trouble, or making you feel uncomfortable or unsafe, then the best thing you can do is block and/or report them.

2. Never share personal information

The problem with the internet is it's way too easy to pretend to be someone you're not. It's difficult to trust someone you meet via the

internet, as you can never actually know if they're who they say they are. Although it's incredibly risky making friendships online, always make sure a parent is aware of the person you're talking to.



Make sure you bring an adult with you if you ever arrange to meet your friend, and ensure you meet in a public place; don't let them convince you otherwise. And don't share personal information online, such as your phone number or address, and where or when you're going somewhere.

3. Always use secure passwords

It won't be fun getting hacked. To prevent this, you can set complex and personal passwords that even smart hackers couldn't guess (a lot of them can be very clever and can guess your password from information you share online).

Also, don't use the same password for multiple accounts. That way it's harder for hackers to access all your accounts when they've managed to get into one.

The closing date for entries is 24th November and judging will be during the week commencing 4th December 2017. Prizes will be awarded to first, second and third places.



50th anniversary celebration

A special “Community Celebration Day” was held on Saturday 30th September to mark 50 years since James Peacock School moved to its current location in Manor Park. The new buildings replaced the original “free school” built in 1875 on the corner of Asher Lane and The Green (now Adlard Print), which had become too small for our expanding village.

Ruddington Local History Society carried out research into the school’s past in order to put up a display at the event – including many historic photographs.

Organisers provided lots of fun activities on the day, including singing, dancing, a “Cava Cavern”, a 1960s Photo Booth and lots of stalls. Of course, there was birthday cake, too! Representatives from “The Green Space” were also there, explaining how they hope to bring Ruddington’s former Youth & Community Centre back into use (see separate article).

As well as celebrating their half century in Manor Park, the event hosted by The Mustard Seed Project showcased all the work the school has been involved with in building a new school in Uganda. They also held a Grand Raffle with the aim of

raising enough money to send a container full of educational equipment there. Prizes included hotel stays at Radisson Blu and Mr & Mrs Smith’s Boutique Hotel, as well as a Radley handbag, Starbucks hamper, restaurant vouchers, fruit and veg spiralizer, and lots more.

Bat Hibernaculum

25 years ago in 1992, pupils from both James Peacock and St Peter’s Schools attended the closing of a Bat Hibernaculum, which was constructed as part of the development of Rushcliffe Country Park.



The pupils made a torch-lit visit into the 52m long tunnel, set 2m deep. Inside they saw the specially-made bat bricks stuck to the walls to enable the bats to roost inside. After their visit, the doors of the hibernaculum were padlocked to preserve the local bats. A camera

crew from Blue Peter also filmed the occasion.

Over the years, the Nottingham Bat Group has monitored the tunnel and it is now a popular haunt for brown long eared bats.

Distraction crime in Ruddington

The Parish Council has been made aware of some incidents of distraction crime that have taken place in the village recently.

One resident had £90 taken from her purse whilst speaking to a man of Eastern European appearance outside the Co-op on Church Street.

A second incident occurred outside the chip shop, but on this occasion the resident didn't take out her purse and nothing was taken.

There have also been reports of a number of 'rogue trader' incidents, where vulnerable residents have been over-charged for remedial works that didn't need doing.
