Will Mark sweep up the medals at the Winter World Transplant Games?

Kidney transplant recipient and Ruddington resident, Mark Brown, has been selected to represent Great Britain at the 10th Winter World Transplant Games (WWTG) in Anzere, Switzerland.



The Games will take place from 7th to 12th January 2018, with Team GB comprising 12 adults and one junior, plus six children competing in the Nicholas Cup (see page 2). The team will be supported by more than 30 relatives, friends and nurses.

50 year old Mark, who received his donor kidney in 1994, is hoping to build on his success at previous Games. He said: "For a team that doesn't have a great opportunity to practice winter sports, we've been relatively successful."

Mark continues: "This will be the sixth WWTG I've attended. After bringing back medals in slalom and snowboarding, I returned from the 2014 games in France with a silver in the team slalom and a gold in curling. In fact, I've now got three gold medals in curling – the British team literally sweep up the medals on the ice rink!"



The WWTG encourages people who've received a transplant to lead active and healthy lives, whilst showcasing the benefits of transplantation.

The aim is to raise awareness of the need for more people to sign on to the Organ Donor Register.

In the UK alone, 6,500 people are waiting for a life-saving transplant and every day, three people on the waiting list die.

A big part of the WWTG is the Nicholas Cup. Mark explains "A seven year old boy from California, Nicholas Green, was killed by highway robbers in 1994 while vacationing in Italy with his family.

"His parents agreed to donate his organs and corneas, which went to seven Italians waiting for transplants. Reg and Maggie Green spoke openly to the media, with no bitterness, about their loss and decision.

"The world took the story – and the Greens – to its heart. Organ donations in Italy have quadrupled since Nicholas was killed and thousands of people are now alive who would otherwise have died."

In memory of Nicholas, the Nicholas Green Camp takes place during the Winter World Transplant Games, culminating in a slalom race at the end of the week where the children compete for the Nicholas Cup.

Adds Mark: "The Games provide the dual opportunity to give thanks to the donor families – without which none of the athletes would be here to compete – and encourage everyone to discuss their wishes about organ donation with their families."

Asher Lane appeal - have your say

Space Foods Ltd are appealing against Rushcliffe Borough Council's decision to refuse planning permission for 175 dwellings to be built on Asher Lane.

The Parish Council submitted a representation objecting to the original application, based on the adverse impact that increased traffic in the Asher Lane area would have on Ruddington as a whole.

The Borough Council then rejected the application on 3 grounds:

1) **Noise.** The developers didn't indicate how they would deal with the noise coming from the Premier Pets Hotel kennels and the impact this would have on residents.

2) **Location.** The site is located within the Green Belt, where development of the size proposed is felt to be inappropriate.

3) **Traffic.** The Borough Council objected on the same grounds as the Parish Council. It was felt that the

developers hadn't provided enough detail to effectively mitigate the potential traffic problems that the development would cause.

If you commented on the original planning application, then your representation will automatically be forwarded to the Planning Inspectorate, to be considered as part of the appeal process.

Esmie Winwood – a name to watch

14 year local girl, Esmie Winwood, has enjoyed playing football from an early age, starting out in the boys' team at Ruddington Colts. As a young child, she was identified as having potential by Sarah Richardson, who ran the after-school clubs that Esmie attended. Sarah is now a coach with Nottingham Forest.

Esmie eventually moved to a girls' team at West Bridgford Colts and then got a place on the Nottingham Forest Regional Talent Club (RTC) programme.

Her determination has now resulted in her being selected to join the elite section of the FA Girls' National Performance Camps. The next stage is to play for the England U16 and above age groups, with her ultimate goal being to play for the England Women's Senior Team.

Currently, Esmie has to combine her studies as a Year 10 pupil at Rushcliffe School with attending residential training camps, where she's trained by qualified FA coaches.
