Rushcliffe Wildlife Watch Group has been voted the winner of the prestigious "Wildlife Watch Group of the Year" for 2017 by the Royal Society of Wildlife Trusts. The Group's announcement said:

"Well done Rushcliffe! This fantastic Group is really led by the children – they spend lots of time outdoors (a must for a Watch Group!) and lots of their members have won Hedgehog Awards this year by helping wildlife in their area.

During 2017, the children took turns to take the group's knitted mascot, Mr Hedgehog, on adventures and completed his diary over the course of the year. They also made treats for the birds, built a mini-beast hotel, picked litter and went on a fungi hunt... And that was just a few of their sessions!"

Awards judge Ellie Bottomley said: "Rushcliffe is a fun, creative and enthusiastic Group who impressed me with their Hedgehog Diary of wild adventures, which carried on outside Group activities!"

The award will be presented to the Group by Ian Johnston, Chair of Nottinghamshire Wildlife Trust, at their next session on Saturday 14th April (see Diary page).

The Mary Rose


The story of Henry VIII's flagship, the Mary Rose, comes to the Framework Knitters Museum on Tuesday 24th April at 2.30pm when Kathy Powis will give an illustrated talk in the former Methodist Chapel.

Organised by the Friends of the Framework Knitters Museum (Kathy is Chairman of the Friends), this is the first of three talks to be held during the year.

Kathy, a patron of the Mary Rose Trust for five years, said: "I'd love to be a volunteer for the Trust, but Portsmouth is too far away!

"Instead, I raise money for them by giving talks and bringing the amazing story of the Mary Rose to people in the East Midlands, maybe encouraging some of them to visit Portsmouth for themselves.

"And, of course, by holding my talk at the Framework Knitters Museum, I can indulge two of my passions at the same time."



With memories of her Wing Walk (which raised thousands for the museum in 2016) still fresh in her mind, Kathy will continue her daredevil feats with a sponsored abseil down Portsmouth's 100m Spinnaker Tower in June – this time in aid of the Mary Rose Trust.

The Public Inquiry into the appeal by Space Foods Ltd, relating to their application to build 175 dwellings on land north of Asher Lane, will be held on Tuesday 17th April at 10am.

The Inquiry will take place at Rushcliffe Borough Council's offices at Rushcliffe Arena in West Bridgford. An Inspector appointed by the Secretary of State will attend to decide the appeal.

Members of the public may also attend and, at the Inspector's discretion, express their views.

The Forget Me Not Project

From Bambi to Brief Encounter, there are films that invariably bring a tear to the eye. Others make you laugh, or want to sing or dance.

Films have an extraordinary ability to rekindle emotions and stir memories from your past.

The Forget Me Not Project is developing a new activity around cinema of the 1940s and 1950s.

The sessions will be offered to care homes and memory cafés which work with people living with Alzheimer's disease.

The experience for many people with dementia is that their early memories are well-preserved, but their recollection of recent events is confused or non-existent.

The sessions will explore the experience of going to the cinema: the buildings and auditoria, rolling programmes with adverts, usherettes, and the ubiquitous experience of watching the film through a fog of tobacco smoke.

We'll be including clips from classic films of the period, encouraging participants to reminisce about their own experience of going to the pictures.

Community transport seeks passengers!

Six new drivers – including Jack Rivers from Ruddington (pictured) – are revving up to take more elderly or disabled passengers out and about in Rushcliffe. Rushcliffe Voluntary Transport Scheme (RVTS) has been providing community transport for over 30 years, using voluntary drivers who love helping people get out and about.



Carolyn Perry, Chief Executive of Rushcliffe CVS which runs the scheme, explains: “We’re looking for new customers who need to go out for health appointments, or are keen to go shopping or attend social activities. All our customers benefit from chatting to drivers and other passengers, helping prevent loneliness, foster independence and maintain dignity. The service also helps ease the pressure on health and social care services.”

RVTS means that passengers who find it difficult to use public transport or taxis, or who don’t drive or have access to a

car, can still make safe, affordable and reliable journeys. Passengers joining the scheme pay an annual registration fee, a booking fee and then 45p per mile. Destinations are booked by phone, with all vehicles driven by DBS-checked drivers. The service runs on weekdays during office hours.

RVTS was awarded the Community Transport Quality Mark in 2015 – a sign of a top quality service that operates within the law and follows best practice. Their customers are full of praise, with one commenting recently that: “Your volunteers are wonderful and so helpful – carrying shopping and helping me get up steps. They also chat which is nice when you live on your own.”

Rushcliffe CVS is also developing a new service, “Friends of Community Transport,” to help recruit new volunteers, develop new income-generating initiatives and help with marketing. To find out more, contact Rushcliffe CVS on 0115 969 9060.

Ruddington's popular Jasper's Café celebrated raising over £2,500 last month through the generosity of Ruddington residents.

The café closed its original premises at Bar Six (now Apotheka) in February and since then, owners Paul Carver and Cathy Hatfield have been working hard to renovate their new site at the old Drinks And More convenience store on the High Street.

"The last two months of trading at the Bar Six site were our busiest ever and we had so much positive feedback from our customers.

Our new premises has needed a lot of work, but we wouldn't be able to give it the finish it deserves without the fantastic support of Ruddington with our crowdfunding effort!" says Paul.

"Many of the materials we've used have been reclaimed and upcycled, we've installed new electrics and plumbing throughout, built a brand new kitchen and toilets – and the crowdfunding money has been invaluable in achieving all this".

With Jasper's new, purpose-built facilities, Paul plans to offer a broader menu, including fresh cakes, and also expand the café's outside catering enterprise. He's tight-lipped on the opening date, but hopes to launch in the coming weeks.

There's also a popular cut-price "Golden Years" lunch menu available to older village residents every Wednesday and Thursday, as well as a monthly charity lunch in aid of Maggie's Cancer Care. All in all there's something for everyone and all are welcome.

Bloomin' Dementia is a charity based in Ruddington, which is where the idea was conceived. The main aim is to support people living with dementia to live independently in our community.

The charity assesses a person's needs and recommends a plan to meet them, offering a choice of care options that always highlights support available from the local community.



Bloomin' Dementia also helps people complete application forms for Attendance Allowance benefits. Many people come to No. 4 Easthorpe Street looking for advice and information, after which the Bloomin' Dementia team will complete an assessment and put a care plan into place.

We've started running regular coffee mornings for local residents affected by

dementia, and these are proving very popular. It's still early days but the charity is already extremely busy! We'll keep you informed of opening times and how to contact us outside these hours as soon as we can.

We're grateful for the many donations Bloomin' Dementia has received from local businesses. For example, the Ruddington Co-op has supplied tea and coffee; Ruddington Medical Centre has helped with funding; and many people have provided items for sale, with some special football-related items from Thomas' the greengrocer.

Ruddington Golf Course is also supporting us, whilst Great Northern Inns and Nottingham Forest FC have been crucial to helping us get the charity off the ground.

There are many more supporters and we'll acknowledge you all at some point! It really is marvellous to see how Ruddington is coming together to support Bloomin' Dementia.

We currently have five volunteers helping the charity by raising funds, running the coffee mornings, volunteering their time in the evenings, and generally raising awareness of the charity.
